This summer, three exemplary STAR students got to go to Brush Ranch Summer Camp. Thanks to the generosity of John Kleinheinz, who paid for their trip and necessities, and personally escorted them to camp via his private Learjet, Ly Hoang, Jamie Jones, and Ben Castro reveled in three weeks of fishing, dancing, fencing, riding, and hiking.

The camp's setting high in the mountains of New Mexico made for glorious scenery as well as wild, chilly weather (Ben wrote that the highest night temperature was 45 degrees). Ly describes a horse ride up to Homestead Meadow. "It looks like a scene straight out of *Sound of Music* when Maria was singing in the mountains," she says.

Adventures abounded at the camp, teaching the lessons of survival and self-confidence. In a letter to Mrs. Myers, Ly tells of the girls' three-day hike. "It was raining from the time we began till we stopped," she says. "We were cold and freezing and almost got hypothermia. But after that we became survivors and now believe we can live through anything."

The children returned raving about how wonderful the trip was. Jamie Jones exclaimed, "I loved the camp so much!! The experience was fantastic; although I may not be able to attend the camp again, I will definitely send my children there in the future."

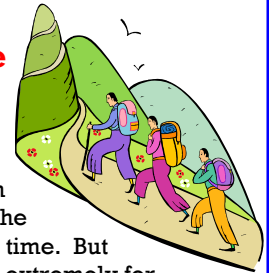
Their parents welcomed them home warmly. "From the moment I saw my child, I was filled with relief and happiness and joy. I am happy that my child was able to experience this trip," Ly's parents said. Marina Mindieta, Ben's

mother, said, "It was extremely difficult to have Ben leave me [for] the

very first time. But I did feel extremely fortunate to have such a great opportunity offered to us. If given a second chance, I would do it every year!"

The new self-confidence the children had gained showed after they came back. A few weeks after the children returned home, Marina wrote us about the changes the trip wrought in Ben, "I feel very honored to have a son who has shown me that he will do fine in life. He has shown me that he can make responsible decisions and take care of himself. Without the trip to Brush Ranch Camp, I don't think I would have realized that. He has gained independence and maturity, as well as confidence in himself. Not a day goes by that he does not strive to prove to himself that he can handle anything that comes his way."
